### Medical Foster Homes for Veterans

December 14, 2025

#### Trained caregivers provide care and services.

For Martha Leon, opening her home to Veterans is not just a calling. It's a way of giving back to those who have sacrificed for their country. Driven by compassion and a sense of community, Leon transitioned from volunteering in assisted living to VA Southern Arizona Health Care System's Medical Foster Home program.



"My journey began as an assisted living volunteer," Leon shared. "One day, a woman I assisted called me and introduced me to VA [Medical Foster Home](#) program. With her encouragement and realizing I had a natural gift for caregiving, I decided to apply."

Three months later, Leon became an official VA Medical Foster Home provider. Her home, meticulously prepared to meet the unique needs of each resident, has since provided a nurturing environment for many Veterans.

"I've been doing this since June of 2014, and every day I grow more passionate about it," she said. "These Veterans become like family; some even call me mom."

VA Medical Foster Home program is a comprehensive initiative that integrates Home Based Primary Care (HBPC) for Veterans who are unable to live independently. Veterans receive personalized support that includes regular home visits from their HBPC primary care team (doctors, nurses, dieticians, occupational therapists, social workers, pharmacists and psychologists). In addition, the team provides essential services in the home that can eliminate the need for hospital trips.

"The support is incredible," Leon emphasized. "Everything the Veterans need is provided right here in their Medical Foster Home."

Running a VA Medical Foster Home requires a multifaceted approach, from assisting with everyday activities like feeding and toileting to managing medical needs such as feeding tubes and catheters. Martha's home acts as a sanctuary where Veterans receive three nutritious meals a day, laundry services and even personalized care for specific dietary requirements.

"For instance, if a Veteran has diabetes, we prepare special meals for them," she noted.

Leon finds the most rewarding aspect of her work to be the transformation that she witnesses in the Veterans that come to her home.

“They go from being patients to family members,” she said. “One Veteran has been with me for six years; such bonds mean the world to me.”

## Finding their purpose

Looking forward, Leon is committed to continuing her work.

“I want to do this until I can no longer physically manage it,” she said. “This program is demanding but immensely rewarding. I hope others step up to provide these vital services to our Veterans.”

Leon’s home exudes warmth and care, from meticulously laundered clothes to a well-stocked medicine closet, ensuring a safe, hygienic environment for all. The outdoor space is equally inviting, offering a serene setting for picnics and relaxation.

“I hope that one day, if I ever need care, someone will treat me with the same love and respect I give to my Veterans,” she added, reflecting on the spirit of her work.

## VA to improve health care choice and quality for Veterans with new community care contracts.

**WASHINGTON** —The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs today released a request for proposals (RFP) for new community care contracts that will improve health care choice and quality for Veterans over the next decade.

A’s community care program enables Veterans to access health care from non-VA medical providers at the department’s expense. Community care has been an integral part of caring for Veterans since the World War II era. In 2018, President Trump enshrined this right for Veterans by signing the bipartisan [MISSION Act](#). Today, about 40% of all VA care is provided through community care.

In 2018, VA signed contracts with health plans to serve as third-party administrators and manage VA’s community care program. Many of these contracts are set to expire in 2026, and a new round of contracts is needed to ensure Veterans have continued access to the community care program.

The RFP VA announced today will lead to new community care contracts that will improve health care choice and quality for Veterans over the next decade in the following ways:

- More Choices for Veterans – The new indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity (IDIQ) contract structure will provide more choices by allowing multiple national and regional health plans to compete to serve Veterans. Selected health plans will provide care and benefits uniquely adapted to Veterans and their communities.
- Improved Quality of Care for Veterans – The contracts will require health plans to adhere to broad industry standards of care used by all other major health care systems. This will ensure Veterans get care that has been shown to directly address their medical conditions and maximize their health and wellness.
- Improved VA Oversight of Community Care – The contracts will provide VA with the data, technology and systems to manage Veterans' care in real-time, drive innovation, and collaborate with the selected health plans to ensure that Veterans receive the highest quality health care.
- Contract Flexibility – The new IDIQ contract structure allows VA to issue multiple, competitive task orders over the life of the contract in order to adjust health plans, regions, contract requirements, and deliverables and ensure that health plans are empowered and accountable. Contractors that do not meet VA requirements can be off-ramped and replaced by other IDIQ health plans to ensure continuity of services and no disruption of care to Veterans or VA operations.

“VA has learned a lot about community care over the years, and we are putting that knowledge to use to help Veterans with the next generation of community care contracts,” said **VA Secretary Doug Collins**. “This RFP will result in contracts that dramatically improve our ability to provide quality health care while ensuring Veterans can choose the care that’s best for them.”

### FACTS YOU MAY NOT KNOW:

There is a distinct difference between an Honor Guard and a Color Guard. Every Honor Guard is also a Color Guard. Color Guards are NOT Honor Guards as their duties and responsibilities are limited. Generally, a Color Guard will carry the colors, post the colors and march in parades. Our Post is an Honor Guard!

Honor Guards are known for their precision and attention to detail. They perform a variety of ceremonial duties, including:

- \*Presenting and guarding the colors (national, state, and organizational flags)
- \*Rendering honors, such as presenting arms, saluting, volley and taps at funerals or memorial services
- \*Providing escort services for dignitaries or fallen comrades
- \*Participating in parades, change of command ceremonies, and other official events
- \*Posting and retiring colors

Each month our Post recognizes a member of our Honor Guard for his dedicated service to VFW Post 7234 and for his commitment to honor our deceased comrades. This month we recognize Honor Guard member Hugh Spafford.

When asked why he joined our Post Honor Guard, this is what Hugh said.

“I have been an Auxiliary member of VFW Post 7234 since 2019. My father John D. Spafford served in the US Navy Reserves from November 22, 1943, to May 5, 1946. He served as a Motor Machinist Mate, Third Class and served in the Pacific Theater during WWII. He was awarded the American Theater Medal as well as the Asian Pacific Medal, 2 Stars Victory Medal. My Dad was an honorable man and very proud of his service in the Navy. To memorialize his time in the Navy, my Dad got a tattoo of an anchor with the wording US Navy on his right forearm. As a kid, I recall the many stories my father would tell about his time in the Navy.

I learned about the Honor Guard from my neighbor and Captain of the Honor Guard, John Gossart. After meeting John at a social event in our neighborhood, I quickly figured out that we

had a lot in common, mainly that we worked many years in the building, yet doing completely different work. John asked me to consider joining the Honor Guard which I did in June 2021. Serving as a member of VFW Post 7234 Honor Guard is a significant and meaningful experience for me. It gives me the opportunity to pay tribute to the brave men and women who served in the military by recognizing their sacrifices and contributions to our nation. I also find personal satisfaction and a sense of pride and camaraderie serving as an Honor Guard member. It offers me the chance to build friendships and give back to the veteran community. Overall, serving as an Honor Guard member is an exceptional way to honor the past while actively participating in the present, ensuring that the sacrifices of the veterans are never forgotten.”

## THE WONDER OF CHRISTMAS CONTINUES

As we move into the new year (Did 2025 go by fast for you?) I was going to report on a few military developments I thought you'd find interesting, like good news in recruiting and the status of legislation needed to change the name of the Department of Defense back to the pre-1947 Department of War name. (A Presidential Executive Order is not enough.) Then I came across a story in the Washington Post about the North American Aerospace Command (NORAD) tracking Santa's trip around the world on Christmas Eve for children and thought: This is our mission too—and has been—caring about children.



According to the article, the story began in 1955, when Air Force Colonel Harry Shoup, commander of the air defense tracking headquarters in Colorado Springs, CO (then known as the Continental Air Defense Command) received a call on the emergency-use only "red phone." A small voice asked, "Is this Santa Claus?" Colonel Shoup first reprimanded the caller, thinking it was someone playing a joke. Then, realizing it was a little boy, he pretended to be Santa and talked to the boy for a while, and then to the boy's mother. From the mother he learned that she got the phone number from a Sears Roebuck ad that because of a typo, was indeed the CONAD red phone number. While the mistake was being corrected with AT&T, Col. Shoup had his staff answer every other call as Santa's helpers.

Wanting to carry the fun for children further, on Christmas Eve that year, the Colonel informed a local radio station that CONAD had picked up a sighting of an unidentified sleigh-shaped object travelling fast from the North Pole. The station loved the news, the networks got involved and a fun annual tradition was born.

Now, 70 years later, NORAD does a more elaborate job providing tracking info on Santa's global trip on Christmas Eve, with input from satellites, radar and aircraft feeding map data to websites and social media. That includes location info in eight languages and a live call-in center in Colorado for kids, staffed all day on December 24 fielding tens of thousands of calls (126,000 in 2017). A Canadian officer assigned to NORAD said: "This is our most feel-good mission. We know it brings joy to kids around the world." God bless all who served. Their lives made more of an impact than they imagined.

We've come a long way from the days of Harry Shoup, that no-nonsense fighter pilot commander, who loved the kids and became known as "Santa Colonel." (Now that's a great "call sign.") It exemplifies our military at home and around the world.

With that Merry Christmas season story, Rosemary and I wish everyone a happy and wonder-filled New Year.

## **Change to Auxiliary Membership Applications**

All Auxiliary applications will need to be submitted on the new forms (Revision January 2026 in bottom right-hand corner). A copy of the form is attached. This revised copy is available on line on the VFW website.

National has made some changes to the form to make it easier to fill in. The biggest change is how applicants can pay by credit card.

Effective immediately, Auxiliary 7234 will not receive any credit card data on the application for membership.

The applicant can still check the box for credit card and then must follow the instructions on the application once it is processed.

We will accept and forward the application to the Investigating Committee for eligibility. If found eligible, the application advances to general membership approval. When approved, the Treasure shall forward the approved applications where any credit card payments will be processed.

“If paying by credit card, after the application is processed, an email and/or text message will be sent to the contact information provided above for payment. Instructions in the communication for payment must be completed within 30 days or otherwise the application will be voided. If

someone other than the applicant above is paying by credit card for the membership, please list your phone number and email address below to receive payment instructions once the membership application has been processed.”

The treasurer shall receive notification of credit card payment.

Any applicant paying by credit card will not be notified of acceptance to the Auxiliary until National notifies the Auxiliary treasurer.

## **2025 MASON DIXON MEMBER RENEWALS**

It is that time of year when Mason Dixon members whose membership expires on December 31, 2025 will begin the process of renewing their memberships. **Beginning November 15, 2025**, the Post will begin accepting renewal dues for Mason Dixon members whose cards show an expiration date of 12/31/2025. All dues for 2025 expiring Mason Dixon memberships must be received by December 31, 2025. **Please check your card and make payment, if necessary. You will not receive any further notice of your need to renew.**

Effective January 1, 2023, membership renewals and new memberships were changed to a two-year term. So, please remit \$150.00 before December 31, 2025 and your new card will expire on December 31, 2027. New membership cards will be available the beginning of December. Dues payments may be mailed, placed in the Mason Dixon box at the membership station, or dropped off at the bar. If you wish to receive your card by mail, you will need to submit a self-addressed stamped envelope with your renewal payment. Otherwise, new cards will be available for pick up at the bar once your payment has been received.

### **REMINDERS AND CHANGES TO THE MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL PRACTICES**

#### **REMINDERS**

AS YOU MAY RECALL IN AUGUST 2022 THE POLICY WAS CHANGED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS THAT NO ADVANCED PERSONAL NOTICES TO RENEW YOUR MEMBERSHIP WOULD BE SENT OUT.

THE POLICY CHANGES ALSO MADE IT CLEAR THAT THE MEMBER IS RESPONSIBLE FOR MAINTAINING THEIR MEMBERSHIP CURRENT AND IN GOOD STANDING, NOT THE POST.

THE POLICY ALSO STATES THAT MASON DIXON MEMBERSHIP CARDS WILL NOT BE MAILED. MEMBERSHIP CARDS ARE TO BE PICKED UP AT THE POST (AT THE BAR).

## **NEW CHANGE EFFECTIVE AUGUST 1, 2025**

THE MASON DIXON MEMBERSHIP POLICY STATES:

“ALL RENEWALS FOR EXPIRING MEMBERSHIP MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE POST NO LATER THAN 60 DAYS FOLLOWING THE END OF THE MEMBERSHIP TERM. NO RENEWAL WILL BE PROCESSED AFTER MARCH 1, FOLLOWING THE PREVIOUS MEMBERSHIP YEAR. RENEWALS RECEIVED AFTER SUCH DATE WILL BE RETURNED WITHOUT ACTION AND MEMBERSHIP WILL BE TERMINATED.” THE MESSAGE IS CLEAR! DO NOT LET YOUR MASON DIXON MEMBERSHIP LAPSE!!

SINCE THE EFFECTIVE DATE (08/01/2022) OF THE POLICY CHANGES, TOTAL POST MEMBERSHIP HAS GROWN TO OVER 4,600 MEMBERS. THIS IS A 1,100 MEMBER INCREASE IN LESS THAN THREE YEARS! DESPITE THE PROVISION ABOVE REGARDING RENEWALS, THE BOARD HAS ALLOWED VETERAN MASON DIXON MEMBERS TO RENEW THEIR MEMBERSHIPS EVEN IF SUBMITTED LATE. VETERAN MEMBERS WERE PERMITTED TO RE-APPLY FOR MEMBERSHIP. THIS PRACTICE WILL CEASE EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2025.

THE BOARD RECENTLY UNANIMOUSLY VOTED TO CHANGE THIS PRACTICE. BEGINNING AUGUST 1, 2025, VETERAN MASON DIXON MEMBERS WILL BE PERMITTED TO RENEW ONLY ONCE AFTER THEIR FIRST LATE RENEWAL. VETERAN MASON DIXON MEMBERS WHO HAVE ALREADY RE-APPLIED PRIOR TO THE EFFECTIVE DATE WILL BE GIVEN ONE MORE OPPORTUNITY. THIS IS BEING ALLOWED ONLY BECAUSE THE BOARD VOTE JUST OCCURRED AND THE CHANGE HAD NOT BEEN COMMUNICATED UNTIL NOW.

IN ADDITION, THE LATE VETERAN (ONLY) RE-APPLICATION MUST BE ACCCOMPANIED NOT ONLY BY THE \$150 DUES, BUT ALSO A \$25 PENALTY FEE (FOR BEING LATE). THEREAFTER, IF THE VETERAN MASON DIXON MEMBER DOES NOT TIMELY PAY THEIR DUES AGAIN, THE VETERAN MASON DIXON MEMBER’S MEMBERSHIP WILL BE PERMANENTLY TERMINATED.
