Hello comrades and auxiliary,

In maintenance news, John, Marty, Rielly, and Jeff have been hard at work maintaining Landscaping around the Memorial Garden and directly in front of our building. We had a professional Landscape come in and clean up around the gazebo, remove a big bush on the right side of the walkway going into the Post. The handyman crew also installed new lights in the gazebo.

Regarding VFW National Grants, our applications have been submitted. We have received \$3,000 in grants from the VFW, \$1,500 to the post and \$1,500 to the home of the brave. We should know by June 29 about the state grant for \$20,000..

Our food donations have slowed over the summer months and we are in need of supplies for our food bank to support the families in need. Our casserole program continues to be successful; thank you to Jim Jensen and Mike Tuckman for delivering these to our supported churches. We are also continuing our annual "Coats and Sweats for Vets" drive. Please drop off men's or women's clothing in the plastic container located in the Post lobby.

I am including this note:

I am writing to share the history and impact of the community outreach initiatives at VFW Post 7234. Our post is dedicated to supporting both our veterans and the local community, most notably through our long-standing casserole program.

The program's origins date back 28 years to my time in Bel Air, MD, where my wife, Debbie, and I participated in a similar initiative at St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church. After joining Post 7234 in Delaware, we identified a local need when St. Paul's by the Sea Church faced facility challenges for their annual Christmas dinner. Our canteen manager, Mark, offered our kitchen to assist, which inspired us to establish a permanent service model.

What began with 15 frozen casseroles has grown significantly due to the dedication of our VFW and Auxiliary members. To date, we have delivered nearly 3,000 casseroles to several organizations, including Bethel Mariner, the Church of Christ, the Bethany Fire Department, and Our Lady of Guadalupe.

Beyond this program, Post 7234 has managed the St. Paul's Christmas party for three consecutive years, and assisted in serving monthly lunches to 50 to 100 individuals experiencing homelessness's ,and donated turkeys to the Georgetown Cheer Center.

The success of these programs is a direct result of our volunteers and staff who manage the distribution of meals. We are proud of the positive influence our post continues to have on the community and look forward to continuing this vital work.

We have another program in the community outreach program, which is called COATS AND SWEATS for vets. We have donated in the past two years over 3000 pounds of clothing to American Veterans Thrift Store in Rehobeth again this is not possible without the generosity from the VFW Members and auxiliary.

Getting emergency care at non-VA facilities



If you think your life or health is in danger, call [911](#) or go to the nearest emergency department. You don't need to check with the VA first.

But if you go to a non-VA facility—even one that's in our community care network—you must follow certain rules so that we can cover the cost of your care. Keep reading on this page to learn what you need to know if you go to a non-VA facility for emergency care.

What to know if you go to a non-VA facility for emergency care

The facility must be an emergency department

We can only cover the cost of emergency care at an emergency department. An emergency department is a facility that has the staff and equipment to provide emergency care (like a hospital

Urgent care facilities don't qualify as emergency departments. If you're not sure what type of facility you should go to, we can help.

We must get notified of your care within 72 hours

Ask the provider to notify us right away in either of these ways:

- [Through our VA emergency care reporting portal](#), or
- By calling us at [844-724-7842](#) (TTY: [711](#))

We must get the notification within **72 hours** of when your emergency care starts. We prefer that the provider notify us. But if they don't, you or someone acting on your behalf can notify us instead.

Note* Don't call before you get to the hospital because you'll probably be talking to someone in a faraway State who has no idea where you are at or if you've been admitted. They may need to talk to the admitting nurse.

Emergency care eligibility requirements

Eligibility for emergency mental health care

In most cases, we will provide or cover the cost of your emergency mental health care and up to 90 days of related services—even if you're not enrolled in VA health care.

If a health care provider or a trained crisis responder determines you're at risk of immediate self-harm, we can provide or cover the cost of your care if you meet at least 1 of these requirements:

- You were sexually assaulted, battered, or harassed while serving in the Armed Forces, **or**
- You served on active duty for more than 24 months and didn't get a dishonorable discharge, **or**
- You served more than 100 days under a combat exclusion or in support of a contingency operation (including as a member of the Reserve) and didn't get a dishonorable discharge. You meet this requirement if you served directly or if you operated an unmanned aerial vehicle from another location.

If you go to a non-VA emergency department for help, tell the staff you're a Veteran. Ask them to contact us right away.

Eligibility for all other emergency care

General eligibility requirements

By law, we can only cover the cost of your care at a non-VA emergency department if you meet all of these requirements:

- You're enrolled in VA health care or you have a qualifying exemption from enrollment, **and**
- A VA health care facility or other federal facility that could provide the needed care wasn't "feasibly available" (meaning it was too far away for you to get there fast enough to get the emergency care you needed), **and**
- A person with an average knowledge of health and medicine (called a "prudent layperson") would reasonably believe that a delay in seeking care would have put your life or health in danger, **and**
- You meet our other requirements based on your specific situation—including the time limit for us to receive your claim. Keep reading to learn more about requirements for different situations.

Note: We only cover non-VA emergency care until we can safely transfer you to a VA or other federal facility. The only time this rule doesn't apply is if the community provider contacts us and we can't accept your transfer.

What to do if you're charged for emergency care

If you get a bill for emergency care at a non-VA facility and you think we should cover the cost, we can help. Call us at [877-881-7618](tel:877-881-7618) ([TTY: 711](tel:877-881-7618)). We're here Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. ET.

We'll go over the charges with you and help figure out who should cover the cost of your care. We can also help resolve billing issues with community providers.

When to choose urgent care

Our VA and in-network urgent care providers can meet many of your health needs. They may be able to provide some diagnostic tests, like certain blood and urine tests. And you can often get care for minor illnesses or injuries much faster than in an emergency room.

Urgent care might be right for you if you have health problems or symptoms like these:

- A sore throat or persistent cough
- Strains, sprains, or minor broken bones
- Deep cuts that are no longer bleeding a lot
- Allergies
- Mild burns
- Mild nausea or vomiting
- Urinary tract infection symptoms (like needing to pee often or urgently, or urine that looks cloudy or smells bad)

Eligibility for urgent care

You can get urgent care at VA medical centers and in-network community providers, if both of these descriptions are true for you:

- You're a Veteran enrolled in VA health care, **and**
- You received care at a VA or in-network provider in the past 24 months (2 years)

To check your eligibility, contact your local VA health facility. Or call us at [800-698-2411](tel:800-698-2411) ([TTY: 711](tel:800-698-2411)). Select option 1, then option 3, then option 1.

Note: Your family members can't use your urgent care benefit.

What to do when you arrive at a community urgent care provider

- **Confirm that the provider is in our network.** Check for a posted sign or ask a staff member. If you go to an out-of-network urgent care provider, you may have to pay the full cost of care. By law, we can't pay claims for out-of-network providers.
- **Fill out the provider's intake form.**
- **Tell the provider you want to use your VA urgent care benefit.** Show the provider your urgent care billing information card. The provider will call the phone number for your region listed on the card to check your eligibility.
- **Don't pay a copay.**

HONOR GUARD NEWS

There were no funerals in June.

The Honor Guard was involved in several ceremonies and services.

On June 16th, The Honor Guard participated in the D Day Ceremony held at Ft Miles in Lewes, Posting Colors, Rendering Volley and Taps, and Saluting the DE WWII military members who we killed in the war. (see photos).



This is the 3rd year that our HONOR GUARD has been invited to participate in this ceremony and service.

Ft. Miles is a historically significant World War II coastal defense installation located in the Cape Henlopen State Park in Lewes, DE. Built in 1941, its primary purpose was to protect the industrial and population centers of Wilmington and Philadelphia, as well as crucial shipping and oil refining operations along the Delaware Bay and river. Today the site functions as the Fort Miles Museum and Historical Area, where visitors can explore massive underground bunkers, restored artillery parks, and the remaining fire control towers. Featured exhibits on WWII history are large gun batteries, observation towers, military life and technology, including artifacts from the USS Arizona and USS Missouri.



On June 20th the Honor Guard assisted our comrades at the American Legion Post 24 in Dagsboro in the Flag Retirement Ceremony (burning of flags). The Honor Guard began the ceremony with the posting of colors. The program included the history, tradition and explanation of the Flag Retirement Service and Ceremony. The ceremony and service are a dignified event used to respectfully destroy unserviceable flags as mandated by the US Flag Code.

Our Honor Guard Drum Corps (John and Mart Reilly) recently received the new official VFW Kilts which are worn in our services and ceremonies. Looking good!!!



FACTS YOU MAY NOT KNOW:

The VFW Post 7234 Honor Guard was established in the late 1950s shortly after the Mason-Dixon Post 7234 was established. It continues in service today with eighteen* members. It serves as a dedicated unit performing solemn precise military funeral honors and ceremonial duties. The Honor Guard is currently led by Honor Guard Captain John Gossart, a US Army Vietnam veteran.

Our Post is an Honor Guard!

There is a distinct difference between an Honor Guard and a Color Guard. Every Honor Guard is also a Color Guard. Color Guards are NOT Honor Guards as their duties and responsibilities are limited. A Color Guard will carry the colors, post the colors and march in parades.

Our Post is an Honor Guard!!!

Honor Guards are known for their precision and attention to detail. They perform a variety of ceremonial duties, including:

***Presenting and guarding the colors (national, state, and organizational flags)**

***Rendering honors, such as presenting arms, saluting, volley and taps at funerals or memorial services**

***Providing escort services for dignitaries or fallen comrades**

***Participating in parades, change of command ceremonies, and other official events**

***Posting and retiring colors**

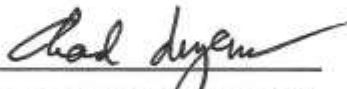


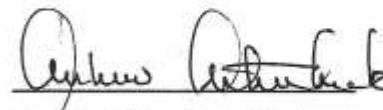

POST ADMISSION POLICY (Memorial Day – Labor Day 2026)

Once again in 2026, from Memorial Day (May 25th) through Labor Day (September 7th), Mason-Dixon VFW Post 7234 will enforce a restricted Post Admission Policy to ensure our Veterans are prioritized for entry. This is a 15 – week period. All Members shall show their valid VFW Membership Card upon entry to the Door Monitors.

- Only VFW, VFW Auxiliary, and Mason-Dixon Members in Good Standing, as well as Active Military Members will be allowed entry to the Post (with up to three (3) Guests per Member). Any Guest accompanying a VFW Member, is required to sign in on our Guest Book. This includes VFW and VFW Auxiliary Members from other Posts, who are likewise required to sign in on our Guest Book.
- All Members seeking entry to the Post shall be prepared to show their current, proper, up-to-date VFW Membership Identification Card either at the entry door, or when asked by a Post Employee or Post Member.
- All personnel entering Post 7234 shall comply with our Canteen Rules, Regulations and Code of Conduct. Members are responsible for their Guests.
- Members of the American Legion (including Auxiliary, Sons of the American Legion, etc.), Vietnam Veterans Association (VVA), Disabled American Veterans (DAV), American Veterans (AMVETS), and other Veterans Organizations are restricted from entry until after Labor Day (unless they are one of the three Guests allowed with each Member).
- If you are an eligible Veteran, or an immediate relative of an eligible Veteran, we encourage you to join our Post. Applications are provided on our website (vfw7234.org), or get hard copies just inside our front door.
